JULY 1993

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

The committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H-584 or S-222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

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The committee amendment (H-199) requires the commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife to adopt rules extending the open water fishing season through November for certain waters of the State.

SUMMARY

This bill proposed to make it illegal to place bait for wild birds or wild animals to attract them to a hunting location during the open hunting season on a wild bird or wild animal.

The committee amendment (S-87) prohibits a person from enticing deer with food during any open deer season. The amendment also prohibits any person from hunting from an observation stand or blind overlooking food that is attractive to deer except that this prohibition does not apply to hunting from a blind or stand overlooking standing crops, food left by agricultural activities, food left by natural occurrence or bear bait placed in accordance with existing laws.

SUMMARY

This bill proposed to limit commercial harvesting of smelt to the use of a hook and line only. Currently, smelts may be harvested with a dip net, baitfish trap, drop net, lift net or bag net.

SUMMARY

This bill proposed to establish a minimum allocation award to all outfitters who have carried 150 or more passengers per year in at least 3 of the 5 years preceding an allocation period.

The bill also proposed to reduce the allocation period by eliminating the requirement for allocations before July 8th.

SUMMARY

Under current law it is a Class E crime to hunt from a paved way or from within the right-of-way of a controlled access highway. This bill proposed to extend the prohibition so that it would be a Class E crime to discharge a firearm across a paved way.

The bill also proposed to suspend the license of a person who fails to be a reasonable and prudent hunter as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 7406-A, subsection 2.

The committee amendment (S-120) strikes and replaces the bill. The amendment prohibits persons from discharging firearms across paved ways. The amendment also alters the prohibition on hunting from a paved way. Under current law, it is illegal to hunt from a paved way. Under this amendment it will be illegal to hunt from a paved way or from within 10 feet of the pavement of a paved way. The amendment also makes parallel amendments to evidentiary provisions of fisheries and wildlife laws.

SUMMARY

Under current law, failure to register a deer is a Class E crime. This bill proposed to change the penalty for failing to register a deer to a Class D crime and to require imprisonment for not less than 3 days for the first offense and not less than 10 days for each succeeding offense and to require a fine of not less than \$1,000.

SUMMARY

This bill proposed to allow disabled persons who hold valid hunting licenses to have antlerless deer permits on request without having to participate in the antlerless deer lottery.

SUMMARY

This bill proposed to remove the statutory cap on the number of moose hunting permits that may be issued in one year and instead to require the Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife to determine annually the total number of moose hunting permits based upon information from the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, Bureau of Resource Management concerning the moose population.
