This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

The committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H-584 or S-222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

This resolve would authorize Stephanie Burton to sue the Town of Freeport for damages resulting from an injury allegedly sustained in a motor vehicle accident that involved a vehicle driven by an employee of the town.

SUMMARY

This resolve would have authorized Philip E. Wolley to sue the State for the costs and expenses that he allegedly incurred in connection with his dismissal from employment. Mr. Wolley was accused of misappropriation of funds and discharged from his position with the State Lottery Commission. The charge was later dismissed.

This bill would have allowed municipal officers to adopt ordinances to set closing hours for agency liquor stores, so long as the municipality's charter generally allows the municipal officers to adopt ordinances.

An Act to Amend the Laws Related to Concealed Weapon Permits

SUMMARY

This bill provides for the designation of either the State Police or the county sheriff as the issuing authority for a municipality for concealed weapons permits and amends the current law to allow fees for issuing concealed weapons permits to be distributed to the county if the designated issuing authority is the county sheriff. The bill also designates the issuing authority for concealed weapons permits in unorganized territories as the sheriff of the county of residence, unless the Chief of the State Police has been designated as the issuing authority. It also permits even those municipalities that do have a chief of police to "opt out," by simple majority vote of the municipal officers and appropriate notice of the obligation to process permit applications for residents of the nearest unorganized territories. Unlike the "opt out" from all permit issuing functions authorized by the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 25, section 2002-A, which requires a concurrence of the Chief of the State Police, the chief's concurrence is not required for a local exercise of the power to "opt out" of the obligation to process permit applications for unorganized territory residents. Finally, the bill provides for a means of distribution of information by the sheriff's office to all police departments within each county regarding who has concealed weapons permits.

Committee Amendment "A" (H-402) replaces all of the original bill except that part dealing with the unorganized territories. The amendment clarifies that the State Police are the issuing authority of concealed weapons permits to residents of the unorganized territories.

House Amendment "A" to Committee Amendment "A" (H-479) clarifies that the State Police issues permits for the unorganized territory.

LD 1295 An Act to Amend the Laws Pertaining to the Protestant CARRIED OVER Episcopal Church

This bill would amend the enabling laws for the organization of the Protestant Episcopal Church in this State by making those provisions gender neutral and making other technical changes to the laws.

SUMMARY

This bill would make the following changes related to the Maine Criminal Justice Academy and the training of law enforcement officers.

1. The bill would increase the membership of the Board of Trustees of the Maine Criminal Justice Academy to include 3 additional citizen members.
