#### SUMMARY

This bill extends the statutory requirement for the child care resource development centers under the jurisdiction of the Department of Human Services from June 30, 1994 to June 30, 1995.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT A (S-396) adds a fiscal note to the bill.

#### SUMMARY

This bill establishes as a general rule that custody and control of the body of a dead person belongs to the spouse of the deceased. If at the time of death, however, the deceased and the surviving spouse are living separate and apart, custody and control go to the next of kin or some other appropriate party. This bill does not alter rights and obligations of parties under the probate laws.

Committee Amendment A (S-417) clarifies and expands the original bill. The original bill addressed custody and control of dead bodies only as it relates to a spouse. The amendment clarifies that provision from the original bill by defining "estranged" and "next of kin." The amendment goes beyond the original bill by establishing a hierarchy among relatives that is used to determine who has custody and control of dead bodies generally. The amendment does not affect custody and control in cases in which no relative or other person assumes responsibility for the body.

HOUSE AMENDMENT B (H-920) provides that any person claiming a close personal relationship to a deceased person for purposes of gaining custody of the body must show evidence to the court of that relationship. The amendment also prohibits an employee of the deceased from gaining custody.

#### **SUMMARY**

This bill deletes the lower and upper limits of the variable adjustment factor used by the Maine Health Care Finance Commission in setting the revenue limits of hospitals. The bill also clarifies that prompt payment differentials do not qualify for revenue deductions in the calculation of revenue limits for individual hospitals determined by the Maine Health Care Finance Commission.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT A (H-834) retains the lower and upper limits of the variable adjustment factor but decreases the lower limit from 0.5% to 0.38%. The amendment also makes a technical cross-reference correction and conforms existing law to current drafting standards.
