SUMMARY

This bill requires that code enforcement officers appointed by municipalities pursuant to shoreland zoning ordinances be certified and appointed for 5-year periods. The bill clarifies when a municipality must employ a certified code enforcement officer and who has standing to bring action against the municipality for violation of the law regarding training and certification of code enforcement officers.

SUMMARY

This bill creates the Maine Office Development Authority for the purpose of renovating or constructing state-owned facilities to house the functions of State Government when practicable and in the best interests of the State.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (S-467) replaces the original bill and directs the Bureau of General Services to conduct a comprehensive review of all state-owned facilities in the Capitol Complex and report back to the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government and the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs with a plan to renovate the facilities. The amendment also directs the bureau to develop a building authority similar to the Maine Court Facilities Authority. The report must be completed by December 1, 1994. This amendment also adds an appropriation and a fiscal note to the bill. The bill died on the Appropriations Table.

An Act to Reduce the Property Tax Burden in Androscoggin LD 1788 County

SUMMARY

This bill governs the use and disposition of surplus funds in Androscoggin County for the county fiscal years 1993 and 1994. The bill requires that any surplus funds remaining at the end of the county's 1993 fiscal year must first be used to restore the county contingent account to the statutory limit. Second, \$100,000 is to be set aside as working capital for the county. Third, all remaining surplus funds must be used to reduce the county tax levy in the county's 1994 fiscal year.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" governs the use and disposition of any future county budget surplus funds in Androscoggin County. If the county has surplus funds, the amendment requires that at least 10% of the surplus must be used to reduce taxes. It also limits the use of any other surplus funds by prohibiting them from being spent on any capital items unless they are used as part of the capital improvement program developed by the county commissioners and approved by the budget committee. The amendment also adds a mandate preamble and a fiscal note to the bill.
