## SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES

#### AUGUST 1995

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, <u>History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents</u>, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

#### **SUMMARY**

This bill prohibited the Secretary of State, the Treasurer of State, the Attorney General, the State Auditor, and any candidate for those offices, from forming political action committees and prohibited them from being involved in the decision making or soliciting contributions for a PAC.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (S-100) replaced the word "candidate" with the words "any individual" because the definition of "candidate" in Title 21-A did not include constitutional officers. It also added a fiscal note to the bill.

#### **SUMMARY**

This bill would have established limits on campaign spending and would have permitted candidates to voluntarily limit the amount of money they spend on a campaign. The bill would have also limited contributions made by political action committees to \$100 per election per candidate.
