SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES

AUGUST 1995

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, <u>History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents</u>, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

SUMMARY

This bill would have authorized a special license plate to be issued to recipients of the Purple Heart.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-154) replaces the original bill. It establishes eligibility requirements for Purple Heart plates. The plates are only to be issued to vehicles in the automobile or pickup truck registration class. A Purple Heart medal recipient may be issued special plates for only 2 vehicles. The Secretary of State shall issue Purple Heart plates that are also vanity plates in accordance with the provisions of the vanity plate laws. The surviving spouse of a Purple Heart medal recipient who was issued Purple Heart plates may continue to use those plates. Family members may retain the plates after the recipient's death but may not display them on a vehicle. This amendment also adds an emergency preamble, an emergency clause, an allocation section and a fiscal note to the bill.

SENATE AMENDMENT "A" TO COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-123) allows individuals who otherwise qualify for special Purple Heart registration plates but no longer operate or register a motor vehicle to be issued a single special plate for recognition purposes only. The single special plate may not be attached to a motor vehicle.
