SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES

AUGUST 1995

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, <u>History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents</u>, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

An Act to Amend the Laws Governing Agency Liquor Stores by Repealing the Bidding Process

SUMMARY

This bill would have limited to \$100 the contributions that may be made by a political committee, political action committee, other committee, corporation or association to a candidate in any election. The limitation would not have applied to contributions from the candidate, the candidate's spouse, the candidate's own political party or individuals contributing in support of the candidate.

SUMMARY

This resolve would have authorized Verne Lee of Smyrna Mills, Maine, to sue the Department of Human Services and the State for damages that occurred when Lee was prevented by the Department of Human Services from seeing his children.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-356) would have removed an unnecessary reference to employees of the Department of Human Services because they were already included as employees of the State. The amendment would have also placed a cap of \$75,000 on the award of damages and added a fiscal note to the bill.

An Act to Amend the Legal Requirements for Establishment of New Political Parties in the State

SUMMARY

This bill would have changed the requirements for the formation of a new political party by requiring the party's candidate to obtain at least 5% of the vote cast in the previous election. Existing law required the party's candidate for President to get at least 5% of the total vote cast in the State for President. This bill would have removed that requirement, and replaced it with the requirement that a candidate of the party get at least 5% of the total vote cast in the State for either Governor, United

States Congress or the State Legislature. In order to continue to participate in the primary election process, the party would have had to continue to have at least one candidate who earns 5% of the total vote in the general election held every 2 years.

An Act to Prohibit Candidates from Attending the Voting Place Except to Vote

SUMMARY

This bill would have prohibited a candidate from attending the voting place except to vote.

The majority of the committee voted ONTP. The minority COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (S-30) would have added a fiscal note to the bill.

An Act to Reduce the Number of Days a Tenant May Be in Arrears for Rent Payments

SUMMARY

This bill reduced from 14 days to 7 days the length of time a tenant may be in arrears of a rent payment before a notice to guit may be served.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (S-28) added language that gave a tenant who was behind in the rent a longer period in which to stop the eviction process by paying the rent due plus any court fees actually paid by the landlord. The amendment also required that the landlord reinstate the tenancy if the tenant paid the overdue rent and the court fees to the landlord before the court issued the writ of possession. The amendment revised the statements that must be in the notice to reflect this change and added a fiscal note.

HOUSE AMENDMENTS "A" AND "B" TO COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-139 AND H-183) both attempted to reword the statements to be included in the notice to the tenant so they would be understandable at a lower reading level. (Not adopted)
