SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES

AUGUST 1995

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, <u>History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents</u>, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

3. Future unfunded liability arising from experience losses must be paid over a 10-year period.

The amendment would have clarified the title of the resolution and the headings of the sections proposed to be added to the Constitution of Maine and reworded the referendum question to reflect this amendment and the intent of the resolution. The amendment also would have added a fiscal note to the resolution.

An Act to Require the State to Pay Medicare Costs for Retired State Employees and Retired Teachers

SUMMARY

This bill would have required the Maine State Retirement System to pay Medicare Part B premiums for state retirees and retired teachers who are transferred from state-paid health insurance coverage to Medicare on becoming eligible for Social Security.

LD 178 An Act to Amend the Misconduct Provisions of the Unemployment Compensation Law

SUMMARY

The original bill provided that a single act of negligence may not be considered misconduct under the Employment Security Law unless that act rises to the level of gross negligence. The majority report of the committee would have replaced the bill and provided that one act of simple negligence would not be considered misconduct. The intent of the amendment was to clarify that a single instance of mere carelessness or inattentiveness is not misconduct under current law and that the Law Court's decision in <u>Forbes-Lilley v. Maine Unemployment Insurance Commission</u>, 643 A.2d 377 (1994) does not permit denial of benefits for one act of simple negligence.

LD 184 An Act to Require the Maine Retirement System to Buy Stock in the Paper Companies

SPONSOR(S) COMMITTEE REPORT AMENDMENTS ADOPTED
SIMONEAU ONTP

SUMMARY

This bill would have repealed the provisions governing the Pulp and Paper Environmental Investment Fund and required that the Maine State Retirement System purchase stock in paper companies with operations in the State. The amount of money required to be invested in the paper industry is equal to the recommended appropriation to the Pulp and Paper Environmental Investment Fund.
