SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES

AUGUST 1995

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, <u>History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents</u>, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

An Act to Exempt Rifle and Pistol Ranges from Noise Ordinances

SUMMARY

This bill would have immunized owners of shooting ranges from civil and criminal prosecution for matters relating to noise or noise pollution at the shooting range as long as the shooting range did not generate a sound level in excess of 68 decibels.

An Act Preventing Increases in Certain Processing and Permitting Fees in the Department of Environmental **Protection**

SUMMARY

This bill strikes increases in processing fees and certification fees under certain land use permitting laws, scheduled to go into effect July 1, 1995. The fee increases would have raised an additional \$184,000 for the Maine Environmental Protection Fund (MEPF), which would have been used to reimburse the Ground Water Oil Clean-up Fund for \$184,000 transferred in fiscal year 1994-95 from the Groundwater Fund to the MEPF to support 3 positions.

The bill proposed to repeal fee increases under the Natural Resources Protection Act and the Site Location of Development Laws; fee levels in effect as of June 30, 1995 would have continued in effect. The bill proposed a General Fund appropriation of \$184,000 to reimburse the Groundwater Fund.

The bill also would have prohibited the Department of Environmental Protection from requesting any fee increases from the 117th Legislature in its second regular session or any special sessions.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (S-134) reinstates the fee increases for permits under the natural resources protection laws and for site law permits for industrial parks. Scheduled fee increases for all other types of site 'law permits are repealed.

The amendment also strikes the provisions of the bill prohibiting the Commissioner of Environmental Protection from asking for fee increase legislation during the 117th Legislature and the provisions appropriating General Fund money to the Ground Water Oil Clean-up Fund.
