SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES

AUGUST 1995

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, <u>History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents</u>, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

SENATE AMENDMENT "A" (S-77) corrected a reference in the bill. It provides that a court may not impose a penalty other than the monetary payment of a fine for a violation of a paragraph of the municipal shellfish ordinance statutes that addresses the penalty for harvesting shellfish from a closed area or digging shellfish without a municipal license.

LD 331 An Act to Ban Spurs on Boats

SUMMARY

This bill would have prohibited the use of line cutting devices, also known as spurs, on the propellers of marine vessels, except when a protective cage is also installed around the cutting device.

LD 420 An Act to Require a License for Recreational Harvesting of Marine Organisms and for the Operation of Marine Party Boats

SUMMARY

This bill would have required that marine recreational anglers be licensed in order to fish for, take or possess any marine species for personal use or consumption. The bill would have established a marine recreational fishing license for individuals and a marine party boat license for party boat operators and their passengers. The bill would have established the Marine Recreational Fishing Fund through which revenues from the licenses and all fines and property seized for violations of license requirements would have been used to fund marine recreational fishing programs. The bill would have also established a Marine Recreational Fishing Advisory Council to advise the Department of Marine Resources on marine recreational fishing issues.

LD 472 Resolve, to Ensure Consistency in State Rules Pertaining to Municipal Assessment of Clam Flats

SUMMARY

This resolve would have required the Commissioner of Environmental Protection and the Commissioner of Marine Resources to work together to review laws and rules that apply to municipal assessment of shoreland areas for shellfish harvesting and to determine the federal standards that apply to those surveys. The commissioners would have been required to report their findings to the Joint Standing Committee on Marine Resources by June 1, 1995. That report would have been required to identify all changes to state laws and rules needed to ensure that the requirements of those surveys conform to federal standards and that towns conducting the surveys are subject to one set of rules administered by one state agency. Those necessary rule changes would have been required to be adopted by June 15, 1995.
