SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES

AUGUST 1995

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, <u>History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents</u>, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

Security deposits may not be commingled with the assets of the landlord and disclosure by the landlord regarding the location of the security deposit is required under existing law. This bill would have established a remedy of \$50 in damages for violation of the existing law.

SUMMARY

This bill permitted any candidate tied for municipal office in secret ballot elections to withdraw whether the municipality had adopted an ordinance to permit withdrawals or not. It accomplished this by removing the requirement that a municipality must adopt an ordinance providing for such withdrawal in order for it to occur.

SUMMARY

This bill would have allowed an election official to require a person who is not known by the official to present identification before voting at the polls.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-43) would have given the election official broader discretion than the bill in determining what is acceptable identification for a voter unknown to the election official. It also would have permitted a person who did not provide the required identification to cast a challenged ballot.
