SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, <u>History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents</u>, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

SUMMARY

This bill would have changed the age of the victims of sex offenses to protect victims.

- 1. In the crime of gross sexual assault, the age of consent would have been increased from 14 to 16.
- 2. In the crime of sexual abuse of a minor, the age would have been increased from 16 to 18.
- 3. In the crime of unlawful sexual contact, the age would have been increased from 14 to 16.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-168) was the minority report and would have added a fiscal note to the bill.

SUMMARY

This bill would have enacted a new provision in the Maine Criminal Code to provide that a person is not justified in using force against a law enforcement officer engaged in a search or a seizure if certain circumstances were met.

Some of the concepts in LD 450 were incorporated into the majority ought-to-pass report for LD 543, "An Act to Limit a Citizen's Right to Threaten the Use of Deadly Force against a Law Enforcement Office Engaged in Carrying out Public Duty Except When Justified in Using Deadly Force."
