SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES

AUGUST 1995

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, <u>History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents</u>, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

This resolution proposed to amend the Constitution of Maine to permit revenues derived from the use of the highways and from alternative modes of transportation and fuels used on the highways and in alternative modes of transportation to be spent on obtaining access to rights-of-way for alternative modes of transportation.

This bill would have directed the Department of Transportation to award construction contracts to in-state companies when an in-state company had submitted a bid within 3% of the lowest bid and the lowest bid was submitted by an out-of-state company.

An Act to Implement the Recommendations of the Task Force to Study the Safe Mobility of Maine's Aging Population

SUMMARY

This bill presented the recommendations of the Task Force to Study the Safe Mobility of Maine's Aging Population. It would have provided that one member of the Medical Advisory Board be a gerontologist. It would have required a medical professional to report an individual to the Secretary of State if the medical professional knew or suspected the individual had an uncorrected visual impairment and that individual operated a motor vehicle. It would have required a person to pass a vision exam at every license renewal after age 40. It would have directed the Secretary of State to develop a driver improvement course for drivers meeting the definition of "problem operator." It would have provided for a 2-year license to be issued to persons 75 years of age and older. It would have required pedestrian ways to be considered when projects were reviewed under site law and subdivisions were reviewed by a municipal authority.

The bill would have directed the Department of Transportation to design and implement a data collection system and design and conduct a survey of Maine's population 65 years of age and older to measure unmet transportation needs and evaluate effectiveness of existing transportation services; to develop and implement a centrally coordinated transportation information center and a volunteer driver program; and to educate Maine citizens about alternative transportation.

The bill would have directed the Superintendent of Insurance to study methods to free volunteer drivers from fear of liability. It would have directed the Secretary of State to inform medical professionals of existing immunity provisions and to monitor reports of dementia and present a summary of reports of dementia to the 118th Legislature.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-505), the minority report of the committee, would have required the Secretary of State to develop and distribute forms for reporting visual impairments and to develop and distribute materials to inform medical professionals of the reporting requirement and immunity and confidentiality provisions.

It would have revised the provisions of the bill regarding problem operators and struck the provision for a 2-year license for persons age 75 and older.

It would also have amended the bill to require the Department of Transportation to develop a plan for centrally coordinated information centers and volunteer driver programs rather than requiring implementation of a center and program.

This amendment also would have added a fiscal note to the bill.

SUMMARY

This bill would have required the Commissioner of Public Safety to establish standards for retreaded truck tires that exceed federal standards and to ensure the application of those standards to all road contact tires in all truck inspections.
