**SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE
THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES**

AUGUST 1995

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

An Act to Clarify Protection of Surface Waters in the Licensing of Solid Waste Facilities

SUMMARY

This bill proposed to reestablish the 300-foot setback for the siting of solid waste disposal facilities.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-180) replaces the bill. Instead of requiring solid waste disposal areas to be set back 300 feet from a classified body of surface water, the amendment prohibits the Department of Environmental Protection from licensing a solid waste facility if the facility would cause unreasonable sedimentation or erosion of soil or would otherwise pose an unreasonable threat to the quality of classified surface waters. The amendment also adds surface water protection and erosion and sedimentation control to the list of issues that a municipality may include in its regulation of solid waste facilities.

An Act to Change the Width of the Saco River Corridor and Allow Municipalities to Extend the Corridor Width

SUMMARY

This bill would have reduced the width of the Saco River Corridor to 150 feet and allowed a municipality the option to extend that part of the corridor within the municipality's boundaries an additional 100 feet.

This bill would have required the Board of Environmental Protection to include in the report that it files with the Legislature the number of rules violation handled, the type of violation, how the issue was resolved and who the violators were.
