**SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE
THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES**

AUGUST 1995

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-277) replaces the bill. The amendment allows a person to operate an elementary neutralization unit without obtaining a hazardous waste facility license and to collect and handle hazardous waste without meeting reporting requirements if the operation complies with laws applicable to those processes and the wastes are discharged in a contained area. The amendment also adds an emergency preamble, an emergency clause and a fiscal note to the bill.

LD 674 An Act to Create a Buffer Strip Requirement for the ONTP
Location of Gravel Pits

SUMMARY

This bill would have reduced the required buffer strip between a borrow pit and property lines from 150 feet to 100 feet and allowed for the elimination of the buffer strip between borrow pits of abutting owners in certain circumstances. The bill would have also required that all property lines and natural buffer strips be identified in the field by markings such as metal posts, stakes, flagging or blazed trees.

LD 716 An Act to Repeal the Motor Vehicle Emission Inspection PUBLIC 49
Program

SUMMARY

This bill, which was initiated by citizen petition, repeals the Motor Vehicle Emission Inspection Program.

LD 759 An Act to Prevent and Abate Uncontrolled Tire Stockpiles PUBLIC 314

SUMMARY

This bill proposed to give a municipality credit toward its recycling goal for used motor vehicle tires that are used as fuel in an industrial boiler, if these tires would otherwise be placed in or stockpiled at a landfill, there is not a reasonably available market in the State for recycling these tires and they are incinerated as a substitute for or supplement to fossil or biomass fuels that constitute the primary fuels incinerated in the industrial boiler. LD 382 achieved this change.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-409) replaces the bill. The amendment provides that a person may not dispose, store or process tires at a site or facility unless the site or facility is licensed, exempt from licensing or otherwise authorized to dispose, store or process tires. The Department of Environmental Protection is required to make available to any interested party a list of authorized facilities. The amendment also authorizes the Office of the State Fire Marshal to use its enforcement powers to protect the public from fire dangers posed by uncontrolled tire stockpiles and authorizes the Department of
