**SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE
THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES**

AUGUST 1995

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

An Act to Clarify the Laws Regarding the Ejection of a Person from a Boardinghouse

AMENDMENTS ADOPTED

SUMMARY

This bill established that the law relating to the ejection of disruptive or destructive persons from inns, hotels, lodging houses and boardinghouses applies, regardless of length of stay, if the guest received services typically supplied to transient guests, and possession and control of the room remain with the management of the facility.

This bill was carried over until the second session, pending an agreement among the interested parties.

An Act to Increase the Number of Signatures Necessary for a Candidate to be Listed on a Ballot

AMENDMENTS ADOPTED

SUMMARY

This bill would have doubled the number of signatures required for a candidate to get on the ballot in elections for federal, gubernatorial and state legislative offices.

The minority COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (S-237) would have added a requirement to the bill that candidates for federal congressional, state legislative or gubernatorial office, using the nomination by petition process, must obtain signatures from unenrolled voters. It would have also added a fiscal note to the bill.

An Act to Voluntarily Limit Campaign Spending

SUMMARY

This bill would have established limits on campaign spending and allowed candidates to limit voluntarily the amount of money they spent on a campaign. The bill would have also set up a penalty schedule for candidates who exceeded the voluntary spending limits and a complaint process.
