SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION BEFORE THE JOINT STANDING COMMITTEES

AUGUST 1995

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries. The publication, <u>History and Final Disposition of Legislative Documents</u>, is helpful in determining to which committee any particular bill was referred.

In this document, the committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number, together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various categories of final action are abbreviated as follows:

An Act Concerning Plastic Holding Devices Used in Packaging

SUMMARY

This bill repeals the ban on plastic 6-pack rings, scheduled to become effective 90 days after adjournment of the Second Regular Session of the 117th Legislature. Under the bill, plastic holding devices are required to meet only the minimum degradability standards for plastic ring carriers already required by the United States Environmental Protection Agency. The bill also repeals a requirement that distributors of plastic ring holders and distributors of products that use plastic ring holders report to the Maine Waste Management Agency the amount of ring holders recycled.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-273), which was the majority report of the committee, amends the title of the bill and the text of the bill to clarify that it applies only to plastic rings.

SUMMARY

This resolve directs the Land and Water Resources Council to review a restructuring of the site location of development law to determine if jurisdiction over all or some of the environmental issues addressed under the site law should be shared with municipalities and to identify other alternatives. A report from the council is due by February 1, 1996.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-303) adds an emergency preamble, an emergency clause and a fiscal note to the resolve and clarifies that the Land and Water Resources Council is authorized to submit legislation to the Second Regular Session of the 117th Legislature.

SUMMARY

This bill would have regulated air pollution from automobile refinishing facilities by requiring: that they be located outside of residential zones and at least 300 feet from any residence; that all coating and refinishing operations take place in a completely enclosed building; and that the Department of Environmental Protection enforce emission standards for volatile organic compounds and any other hazardous air pollutant normally released by automobile refinishing facilities at the lowest achievable emission rates for these pollutants.
