Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
Sec. 1. 29-A MRSA §2054, sub-§2, ¶D, as amended by PL 2019, c. 335, §5, is further amended by amending subparagraph (2) to read:
(2) Emergency lights used on an ambulance, an emergency medical service vehicle, a fire department vehicle or a hazardous material response vehicle may include one blue light mounted facing toward the rear of the vehicle so that the light is primarily visible to approaching traffic from the rear only. Any other blue light used on an ambulance, an emergency medical service vehicle, a fire department vehicle or a hazardous material response vehicle must be approved by the chief of the local law enforcement agency of the jurisdiction of the vehicle.
SUMMARY This bill allows ambulances, emergency medical service vehicles, fire department vehicles and hazardous material response vehicles to use blue lights other than the one blue light mounted facing toward the rear of the vehicle presently allowed by law, upon approval of the chief of the local law enforcement agency of the jurisdiction of the vehicle.

Joint Standing Committee on Transportation

Senator Diamond, Representative Martin and members of the Joint standing Committee on Transportation. My name is Nathan Wadsworth and I am bringing forward LD 662 "An Act to Provide Chiefs of Police the Discretion To Allow the Use of Light Bars on Emergency Vehicles."

This bill is a request of the Saco Valley Fire Association in North Fryeburg which is a volunteer fire department that services the towns of Fryeburg and Stow in Maine and the Town of Chatham in New Hampshire. For the committees reference Chatham, NH is cut off from the Conway region by the White Mountains from the rest of New Hampshire and really are part of the Fryeburg, Maine community and their students attend Fryeburg Academy.

What the members of the Saco Valley Fire Association are looking for is more flexibility with the size of the lights on their vehicles when being toned out and responding to an emergency scene. As you can imagine responding to an emergency scene on the hilly, winding roads in western Maine and a large light bar on a vehicle is much safer than the small windshield lights that volunteers have on this side of the border. Many of the firefighters at this department live in Chatham, NH and have light bars on top of their pickups that they use when responding to an emergency scene in Chatham but the light bar stays off when they respond in Maine much to the detriment of their safety.

New Hampshire law allows "full-time or volunteer firefighters employed by municipal, village district, or federal fire departments and forestry departments or forest fire wardens and deputy wardens when authorized by their department heads." What we are looking for is the similar flexibility that NH law allows to fire chiefs to give to their firefighters.

When I was coming back from dinner in New Hampshire the other night I drove past the local Conway fire department where they were having a meeting at their fire barn. There were 8 pickups in the parking lot and every truck had a light bar on the top of the vehicle. I could imagine how much safer a vehicle with a flashing red and white light bar being the first to an emergency scene would make the scene and I hope the committee does too.

Testimony of the Maine Municipal Association

In Opposition to

LD 662-An Act To Provide Chiefs of Police the Discretion To Allow the Use of Light Bars on Emergency Vehicles

March 16, 2021

Senator Diamond, Representative Martin and distinguished members of the Joint Standing Committee on Transportation, my name is Rebecca Graham, and I am providing testimony in opposition to LD 662, on behalf of MMA at the direction of our 70-member Legislative Policy Committee.

Officials are trying to understand why the inclusion of additional blue lights on fire, ambulance or other non-police emergency vehicles is necessary. All emergency vehicles, including police vehicles, encounter individuals who simply do not yield to their operation regardless of the number of lights or sirens on the response vehicle. Officials do not believe adding extra lights and sirens will change this reality.

However, municipal officials are conscious of the burden this will place on their police chiefs. Law enforcement leadership at all levels but especially at the municipal level are already carrying tasks not historically part of this important role like that of philanthropy manager, community health liaison, and cultural advisor.

As drafted, rather than allowing municipal officials to weigh-in on the necessity of lights on these vehicles, this bill puts the police chief in between other municipal departments or private entities to determine if such lights are necessary. If a police chief does not agree that the lights are necessary, this could create animosity between interdependent municipal departments or between the municipality and the private company in the community providing the service.

This is not authority the many police chiefs desire and is better placed with municipal leaders who also must weigh municipal liability and budgetary impact against the necessity. In communities with no municipal police department, such authority would be passed to state or county officials who have no connection to the needs of the community and could authorize an expenditure from a municipal budget outside the normal budget oversight process.

If the committee moves forward with the proposed legislation, officials ask that you amend the authority to make this decision the responsibility of municipal officers, elected or appointed by the community in consultation with their local law enforcement authorities at a minimum. However, municipal officials would prefer that you simply leave the existing law in place and vote ought not to pass on LD 662.

Testimony of Lt. Bruce Scott

NEITHER FOR NOR AGAINST

An Act To Provide Chiefs of Police the Discretion To Allow the Use of Light Bars on Emergency Vehicles

Senator Diamond, Rep. Martin and distinguished Members of the Joint Standing Committee on Transportation. My name is Lt. Bruce Scott, and I am the Commanding Officer of the State Police Traffic Safety Unit. I am here today to testify on behalf of the Department of Public Safety and the Maine State Police Neither For Nor Against LD 662.

This bill would grant authority for the chief of a local law enforcement agency to authorize ambulances, emergency medical service vehicles, fire department vehicles and hazardous material response vehicles to be equipped with and display blue lights.

We believe that the public has been conditioned to blue lights representing law enforcement and there is danger in being misidentified as a police vehicle. A person seeing a vehicle displaying blue lights may go to it for protection or worse have a beef with law enforcement and engage them in a confrontation that they are not equipped nor trained to handle.

Blue lights can often create a higher level of anxiety in motorists and may cause them to overreact when seeing them. Vehicles with blue lights on are often being operated at a higher rate of speed then vehicles with red lights. With time, the motoring public may no longer be able to tell the difference between a police cruiser and these other types of vehicles with blue lights and therefore become somewhat de-sensitized to them. I also fear that motorist may refuse to stop for police officers arguing that they thought it was a different type of emergency vehicle that doesn't require them to stop. As we all know, only a police officer has the authority to pull a vehicle over, but how would motorists know the difference if we all used the same color lights. These other vehicles with blue lights may create fear that a non-law enforcement officer might try stop motorists without the authority to do so. It seems the harm here could exceed the benefit.

We recognize that there are studies that indicate blue lights are more effective at night under normal conditions and the red lights are better during the day and therefore a combination of both may be beneficial. But there are also studies out there that indicate too much lighting, too many colors and different flash patterns are often distracting and confusing. The national Traffic Incident Model approved by congress indicates that conspicuity markings, along with ample lighting for traffic may be the best approach for safety. With that being said, current law already allows these emergency vehicles to display one blue light to rear, but this bill would allow any number of blue lights, anywhere on the vehicle when approved by the chief. I believe the one blue light to the rear promotes safety without creating any adverse conditions that could be caused by this bill.

For these reasons, we are Neither For Nor Against LD 662.

TESTIMONY:

Proponents: Saco Valley Fire Association

- Sponsor submitted this bill at the request of the Saco Valley Fire Association, which is a volunteer fire department that serves the Towns of Fryeburg and Stow, ME and Chatham, NH
- They are looking for more flexibility with the size of lights on their vehicles responding to an emergency scene.
- NH law allows "full-time or volunteer firefighters employed by municipal, village district, or federal fire departments and forestry departments or forest fire wardens and deputy wardens when authorized by department heads."

Oppose: Maine Municipal Association

- All emergency vehicles, including police vehicles, encounter individuals who simply do not yield to their operation regardless of the number of lights or sirens on the response vehicle. Adding extra lights and sirens will not change this.
- If the committee moves forward with LD, suggest amending the authority to municipal officers, elected or appointed by the community in consultation with their local law enforcement authorities.

NFNA: Maine State Police

- The public has been conditioned to blue lights representing law enforcement and there is danger in being misidentified as a police vehicle.
- The harm could exceed the benefit motoring public may no longer be able to tell the difference between a police cruiser and other types of vehicles w/blue lights and become desensitized to them.
- Current law already allows emergency vehicles to display one blue light to the rear, but this LD would allow any number of blue lights anywhere on the vehicle if approved by the chief.

- Asked Maine State Police to find a definition of "local law enforcement"
- Asked Maine State Police to explore idea of allowing personally owned vehicles responding to an emergency scene to use a bar light on vehicle.
